Project Goals and Overview

BBJ Program Goals

Our Purpose: To design and build safe and humane facilities that support NYC's commitment to justice reform

Program Goals

- Facility grounded in **dignity and respect**
- Safe, humane, secure, and efficient environment
- Exemplary public architecture
- Relate to the City it is in and create a sense of place
- **Thoughtful engagement** with City Agencies and community partners
- Minimize impacts to neighboring properties/community
- Provide for site safety
- Optimize overall operations and maintenance efficiency
- Complete within budget and on schedule
- Robust minority- and women-owned business enterprise participation
- Exemplify DDC's principles of excellence in design, construction, and project delivery

Brooklyn Facility Project Overview

1,040 beds for men

- Maximizes flexibility of movement between housing areas for populations that cannot mix
- Balanced therapeutic capacity (21%)
- Retains programmatic elements, including the gymnasium, multi-purpose rooms, and educational and workforce development spaces

• 100 accessory parking spaces below grade

- Sufficient parking for authorized vehicles, reducing placard abuse
- NYPD will operate sally port on State Street, alleviating authorized vehicles on the street

• 30,000 SF of community space

- Will operate separate and apparat from the jail facility
- The City will conduct community engagement to determine programming for the community space later in the process
- Tunnel connection below grade to Kings County Criminal Court
 - Alleviates foot traffic of law enforcement with people in custody.

4) Two community design workshops and one Community Board 2 presentation

- Estimated Date: September 7, October 2, 2023 (Workshops), October 18, 2023 (CB2)
- **Purpose:** Receive and incorporate community input before PDC Conceptual Review

5) One community design workshop and one Community Board 2 presentation

- Estimated Date: Winter 2024
- Purpose: Receive and incorporate community input before PDC Preliminary Review

6) One additional community presentation

- Estimated Date: Spring 2024
- Purpose: To report back before PDC Final Review to show how community feedback was incorporated

The community engagement schedule will be developed in coordination with Percent for Art timeline/inclusion and Public Design Commission (PDC) timeline







Safety

Throughout the organization, patients and staff feel physically and psychologically safe



Trustworthiness + Transparency

Decisions are made with transparency, and with the goal of building and maintaining trust



Peer Support

Individuals with shared experiences are integrated into the organization and viewed as integral to service delivery



Collaboration

Power differences — between staff and clients and among organizational staff — are leveled to support shared decision-making



Empowerment

Patient and staff strengths are recognized, built on, and validated this includes a belief in resilience and the ability to heal from trauma



Humility + Responsiveness

Biases and stereotypes (e.g., based on race, ethnicity, sexual orientation, age, geography) and historical trauma are recognized and addressed
